In the past I've written pretty lengthy articles for the Town Newsletter, so this time around I'll try to keep my message short and to the point. As I've mentioned many times in various ways, you don't have to wait for the quarterly newsletter to learn about what's happening in Town. Feel free to contact me any time by email or phone. I always take everyone's questions, concerns, and feedback seriously and truly appreciate those who take the time to let their town government know what they're thinking. Also, watch the Town's website for news and meeting minutes.

At the end of July the Environmental Assessment (EA) for National Fuel's Northern Access Project was released by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC). For residents who don't already know, this project includes the construction of a large natural gas compressor station on Killian Road. At the time this article is being written, responses to the EA are being filed by the town's environmental attorney and many actively-engaged town residents. I encourage everyone to stay informed about this large and complex project by watching FERC's website (Dockets CP15-115-000 and CP15-115-001 at www.ferc.gov) and also the Pendleton Action Team's social media sites and website (www.pendletonactionteam.com). It's important to let FERC, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, and Governor Cuomo know your concerns as this project moves through the regulatory process.

The Town Board will soon be starting the budget process for 2017. In formulating the budget, the Town Board will be working to stay within the tax cap imposed upon municipalities by New York State government while working to address the Town of Pendleton's many needs. As mentioned in previous newsletter articles and meeting minutes, the Town needs to stay ahead of infrastructure maintenance and upgrades while also providing essential services we all rely on. We are not alone in this struggle as all towns work to address increasing demands on government with limited financial resources. In recent months I've had very good discussions with Highway Superintendent Jeff Stowell and Water & Sewer Superintendent Jim Argo about the various projects that need to be addressed around our town. This includes, for example, continuing main road maintenance while working to address paving needs in the Town's secondary roads, such as subdivisions and developments. These conversations have also helped make informed decisions as we work to secure New York State grant funding to address needs, such as back-up generator power to make sure sewer lift stations work during power outages. Overall, I see this ongoing planning process to be productive in not only formulating a budget for 2017, but helping to create a vision for future years.

Other items being slowly addressed include trail maintenance, community center planning, and other recreational needs in the Town's parks. For example, I've received substantial feedback from residents about the condition of the Town's trail that runs from Meyer Road to Lockport Road. Looking to the future, we will be trying our best to address needs like improved trail maintenance and construction of more meeting space for the Town's various organizations, such as the senior citizens groups. This takes time and planning, but I'm confident in the coming years that we can make progress in all of these areas.

Finally, included in the last Town Newsletter was a recreation survey that was created to help collect data for the Town Board, Recreation Committee, and grant writer to use to inform future decisions and for use in grant applications. Thank you to all who took time to complete and return this survey to the Town Hall. We are finalizing compilation of the results and I anticipate a final report to be available soon.

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

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TOWN HALL MAKING IMPROVEMENTS THROUGH SECURITY ENHANCEMENTS

If you walk into town hall or the highway department to pay a water bill, visit the tax assessor, apply for a building permit, attend a meeting, or pay a traffic ticket, you may take notice of the new cameras that have been installed.

A new multi-channel NVR camera system has been installed around town offices as a recent security feature and enhancement. The camera system and improved technology captures video both real-time monitoring and recorded playback functions as needed to help safeguard the Town of Pendleton, its employees, residents, and visitors.

In a time when Americans face increased threats to infrastructure and the homeland, it is imperative that we do our part as a local community to both prepare and protect individuals to ensure their safety and security within the town departments.

TOWN HISTORIAN

Hello Pendleton Residents!

There has been some requests to look into the true spelling of Feigle Road, or Fiegle Rd. In short, I can't give you an exact answer but after looking at early maps I can see what the road was called then, but I still don't know the exact time when the spelling switched. Going back to the 1908 NY Atlas, that was published by Century Map Co., the road was actually Beach Ridge Road. On the map it shows two large pieces of land owned by M & MC Fiegl. The next map I looked at was the 1938 Niagara Frontier Planning Board Atlas of Niagara County. In this map the road is called Fiegle Road...which I assume they took from the property owners name and either added the e to the end or the e was already on M & MC Fiegls name. We don't know if these people were well educated or not, but it is safe to assume that they were farmers from the large properties they owned, and not all farmers at this time were educated so it is possible that they could have misspelled their own name, or perhaps someone else misspelled it on official documents. Also, as we know the beginning members of Pendleton were very German in heritage and the spelling of "Fiegl(e)" makes sense ("ie" is German), especially since Orrin Fisk would have been his neighbor, and Fisk was a very prominent German farmer. In my opinion this leads me to believe that the proper spelling of the road is in fact Fiegle.

FROM THE WATER/SEWER BILLING DEPARTMENT

Well, here it is the last week of August and it sure looks like summer is going to be hanging around for a while longer. Boy what a hot, dry summer it has been, I sure hope we are going to have a nice fall this year. It seems like over the past few years we have gone from summer to winter with no easing into the frigid temperatures.

I am expecting October water bills to be relatively high, as we have had quite the dry spell for this season (the consumption period for your October water bill reflects water used in July, August & September). Remember that when you compare your water consumptions you must compare billing period to billing period (ex. Oct., 2014 with Oct., 2015; Oct., 2015 with Oct., 2016 and so forth) not previous bill to current bill.

Well I've been very busy with all of the new reader installs that the water & sewer department have been installing. We are missing an awful lot of telephone numbers for the residents in town so if you receive a letter from the Water & Sewer Department please contact them as soon as possible so that we can update your contact information and schedule an appointment to change your reader.

PLEASE REMEMBER THAT THE TOWN OF PENDLETON DOES NOT MAKE ADJUSTMENTS FOR SPRINKLER SYSTEMS OR THE FILLING OF SWIMMING POOLS.

- * Billing cycles occur in January, April, July and October.
- * Water bills are mailed out by the last Friday of the billing month.
- * If you do not receive a bill by the end of the first week of the following month please contact the billing department at 625-8833, ext. 111.
- * For your convenience there is a lockbox located in the foyer at the back entrance to the Town Hall.
- * Payments placed in the lockbox will be credited to your account on the **next business day**.
- * If you pay online please allow **10 business days** for mailing.

If you are selling your home please contact the Water & Sewer Department at 625-8033, as soon as possible to schedule a mandatory water/sewer line inspection. **YOU MUST HAVE YOUR WATER & SEWER LINES INSPECTED BEFORE YOU CLOSE ON YOUR HOUSE!!!** There is a \$25.00 fee for the inspection. If any repairs need to be made, there may be additional fees involved. If you are purchasing a new home please contact our office ASAP to set up an account.

IF YOU ARE LEAVING THE AREA TEMPORARILY (i.e. Vacation) PLEASE BE ADVISED THAT THE POST OFFICE WILL NOT FORWARD WATER BILLS, EVEN IF YOU HAVE A FORWARDING REQUEST AT THE POST OFFICE.

To avoid late fees to your account you can pre-pay your bill(s), or have your bill sent to the temporary address. Please contact the billing clerk at 625-8833 ext. 111 to make these arrangements. 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HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Hello, What a great summer we had. The dry, hot weather has helped us get some of our work done. We were able to finally get a topcoat on the base of Aiken Road between Mapleton and Beach Ridge. This "top" was a special polymer added blacktop like the one we used on Aiken between Lockport Road and Mapleton. For approximately \$7 more per ton, it seems to "outlast" regular top by years. We tried it on Aiken North about 5 years ago and so far the experiment seems to be working really well.

Basically the top went down in 2 really long days and it took approximately a week to do driveway aprons and oil and stone shoulder. The first couple of days I had 20 trucks and another 10 workers on the job running the paver, rollers, etc. Thanks to my crew, some help from the sewer and water department and our summer helpers for working some long, hot days. I also want to thank all the towns in Niagara County for their help as well. We have a great shared services agreement in Niagara County where we all help each other.

As of this letter, we are still trying to get an overlay on Main Road done before the paving season ends. For the past 5 years we stopped chipping brush during July and August and will resume early September. I still cannot put a schedule on it as it is impossible to commit to a certain time with a small crew. Basically we try to get through the town every couple of weeks.

As always, we try to mow as many off road ditches as well as all roadside ditches as late summer early fall approaches. So you may see or hear my crew in front or behind your house as the time goes on.

My plans are also to stripe all of our roads this fall with fresh center line and some of the edge lines near the shoulders. I'd like to have them done in the fall to help with visibility in the rain and snow seasons.

Speaking of those seasons, usually early November we start putting our stakes up to guide our trucks for the plowing season. Those of you with lawn sprinklers can try to mark them so we can place our stakes appropriately.

REMINDER

If you move from your primary residence in Pendleton it is your obligation to notify the Assessor's office. Each residence that is receiving the Star Exemption signed the Star application acknowledging that they would notify the Assessor of their change in residency.

Please remember all exemptions are due by March 1st. If you will be turning 65 in 2016 you may be eligible for the Enhanced Star. If you believe you might be eligible please call the assessor's office at 716-625-8833, ext. 116.

WATER/SEWER DEPARTMENT

What an incredible summer we have had! Now that we will hopefully be experiencing more normal temperatures and cooler nights we can set our sights on getting some of our fall tasks accomplished!

We will be starting our fall fire hydrant maintenance program sometime in mid-October. We flush each hydrant in order to ensure that it opens and closes freely and shuts down completely. We then pump all water out of each hydrant to avoid from freezing during winter season. We also lube the caps to make sure that they can be removed when necessary. If you have a hydrant nearby, it would be greatly appreciated if you could help keep the snow cleared in case of an emergency and allow clear visibility and accessibility.

For your information it is unlawful for any person or company in any manner to obstruct the use or maintenance of any fire hydrants within the Town of

Pendleton or to place any material or utility of any type in front or within 10 feet of either side of a fire hydrant. Any person could be liable for a penalty of \$250.00 and a \$500.00 for each successive violation.

Out of the 1,560 water meter readers in need of replacement in town homes, we only have approximately 10 left. I believe we did pretty well within a year's time. Thank you for your assistance in letting us into your homes to get these water readers replaced and responding to phone calls and letters we sent you. By updating these readers it allows a more accurate and consistent reading and billing process.

WENDELVILLE FIRE COMPANY



We hope that all of you enjoyed our “everlasting summer”!!! Hot and dry, bright blue skies and sun, sun, SUN! Now it’s back to school and back to routine, and that has its place as well as those long relaxing days of June, July, and August.

The firefighters of Wendelville are rolling back into routine as well, with courses in Emergency Medical Aid and Techniques of Firefighting and rescue beginning across the county. It really takes discipline and dedication to seek out, attend and become proficient at so many of these techniques. The Emergency Medical Technician course, for example, has a 120 hour class time requirement and a State written exam as well as a practical demonstration exam to be completed before the certification can be completed. As with other NYS licensure programs such as nursing, ophthalmic dispensing, pharmacy, etc. continuing education is mandated. And we have over a dozen Certified EMTs on the Wendelville roster. That is quite an accomplishment! Even to become a firefighter a course entitled “Firefighter 1” is mandated; it meets three times a week for at least two hours each night from September through November. Then there are more limited classes such as Emergency Vehicle Operations, Apparatus/ Pump Operator, Accident Victim Removal and Firefighter Survival.

All important to the job, all important to the community and all taking a lot of commitment. Believe me, never a dull moment!

Our Ladies Auxiliary is hosting a Vendor, Craft and Artisan Fair on October 15th from 11am to 5pm. They will also have our World-Famous Chowder ready by 11am. Bring your own containers for bulk sale. Hot dogs will also be available. All are invited to come, peruse and purchase!!


Did you know that Wendelville Volunteer Fire Company maintains all three fire halls, which all house modern firefighting and rescue equipment? The Company also maintains and uses the first building they purchased, (second they occupied). That building is now

the “Social Hall” used for housing a gym for members to use for physical fitness and for meeting and training purposes. The “Grove” area is also located here and is still used for special occasions, such as our Harvest Moon 5K run. The last major building project was done was in 1977 when the main hall was expanded to include a large meeting/banquet hall, a members room and offices.

The current equipment consist of 3 Class “A” pumpers/ engines, an ambulance, a brush fire truck, a cold water rescue trailer which contains wetsuits for cold water rescue. We also have a mule and a side-by-side ranger for off road rescue and finally a fire prevention trailer to educate children and adults of all ages.

Emergency Medical Service now accounts for around 75% of all calls. We contain a NYS certified ambulance that provides a BLS level of care. We also utilize paramedic services from local companies and are backed up by Twin City Ambulance for Advance Life Support. Also if needed we will provide mutual aid assistance to the neighboring fire companies as they also do the same for us. Today the WFC provides emergency services for the Town of Pendleton, which encompasses approx. 27 square miles, and maintains the status of being the only local emergency service provider for the town, creating our slogan “*One Town, One Company*”.

As you read this the Harvest Moon 5K Run and Fun Walk will be history. We did want to congratulate a few of our winners! In the Masters division, Tony Cinnotti came in first and Denise Seelbach took the win in the Ladies side. For our walkers, David Dunkowski and Mary McIntosh took home firsts; In our firefighters division, Mike Manth brought home the gold, and finally, our overall winners were Kip Awpwithum for the men and Mary Lawrence for the ladies.
