TOWN OF PENDLETON REGULAR MEETING November 14, 2016

A regular meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Pendleton was held at the Town Hall, 6570 Campbell Blvd., Pendleton, N.Y. on the 14th day November 2016 at 7:00 P.M. A Public Hearing was scheduled for 6:30 P.M. for the proposed 2017 Preliminary Budget. The notice of the Public Hearing was published in the Lockport Union Sun & Journal on November 7th 2016.

PUBLIC HEARING

Budget Director Don Bergman reviewed the Preliminary Budget line by line allowing for any questions or comments after each section of the Budget. He explained each of the increases or decreases.

OTHER REPORTS

Supervisor Maerten reported that the sales tax collected for the month of September 2016 was \$162,902.78 which is an increase of \$6,553.08 from 2015. Year to date total is \$1,205,521.98 that is a decrease of \$18,204.93 from 2015. He also announced that the Department of Transportation has agreed to lower the speed limit on Fisk and Fiegle Roads from 55 MPH to 45 MPH. He thanked the citizens, Niagara County Legislator Tony Nemi, Senator Ortt, Assemblyman Walter for their letters submitted of support to lower the speed limit. He also reported that the Town of Pendleton is on the list for the Department of Transportation for full funding of Fisk Road. He gave credit to Superintendent Stowell who has been pushing for funding of this road for several years.

Councilman Leible thanked the Veteran's Association for a very nice ceremony on Veteran's Day. He also reported that Scout Wyatt Kneepel completed his Eagle Project in time for the Veteran's Day Ceremony. He has a couple of minor items to complete and the installation of a couple of benches to be placed around the memorial. He also asked everyone for their articles for the winter newsletter by Monday, November 21st. The printers would like to have it mailed before the holidays.

Councilman Fischer reported that the Highway Department chipped brush for 2 days, worked with the contractor to pipe Town Ditch #1 by Tan Tara, patched potholes around town, expanded the turnaround at the end of Creekview Drive making an area on the east side to push snow, dug out the lawn for the sidewalk for the Eagle Scout's project, worked on brush overgrown and dirt piles along the path from Meyer to Killian Roads, finished mowing roadside and off side ditches, maintained parks and cemeteries and repaired equipment as needed. He also reported on several scout troops in the area and the various projects they have done. He also said that the scouts had their food drive on Saturday and as usual the Town of Pendleton is very generous with their donations.

Councilwoman Jarvis reported that the Pendleton Lions Club will be having their Christmas Party at Tan Tara December 2^{nd} tickets are available if anyone is interested. She also announced that the Historical Society will be having their annual cookie sale at the Historical cabin on December 10^{th} from 9:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M.

Councilman Ostrowski thanked Doreen for her years of service and recalls that whenever he came in the Town Hall he was always greeted with a smile. He reported that there were 6 violations issued, 5 remain outstanding. There are 15 violations that remain outstanding for the year. There were 28 Building Permits issued in the month of October, for total revenue of \$2,400.00. Several of the permits issued were for accessory building and reroofs. The Board has requested a canvased certified list from Civil Service of candidates so the Board can begin the process for replacement of Dave Gerber upon his retirement. He also mentioned that the Fiegle Road parking lot for the Canal Trail has been completed. It has the space for at least 10 cars. He said that he feels the Town Board and the Canal Corp continue to have good communications. The installation of mile markers will be the next step. These will help in aiding rescue crews to locations along the trail should the need arise. He noted that he will be meeting with Niagara County Public Works to discuss the feasibility of a cantilever bridge along Lockport Road for the Towns Trail to meet up with the States Canal Trail which was one of the options presented previously for the grant money for the Towns Trail. Supervisor Maerten said that he has been quite surprised at the working relationship with Niagara County Departments, Canal Corp, the DOT, Senator Ortt's Office, and Legislator Nemi. He really gets the feeling that the various offices are trying to help out in any way that they can.

Engineer Dave Britton reported that the Water Tank project has been completed and they received the Health Departments approval to put the tank back into service. He said they did a great job and will share some of the pictures of the interior of the tank at the work session. He also reported that FEMA is still in the period of review. It is still about 6 or 7 months away from final adoption.

Attorney Claude Joerg reported that he has been working on the draft for solar panels with Dave Britton. He noticed one item that was not addressed in the draft, that the Town Board discussed, was what happens to the panels at the end of their life. The life expectancy is 25 to 30 years. The concerns are that the panels have cadmium and lead in them and are harmful to the environment and they are eyesores for the community. The cost to remove a 2 megawatt solar panel system can cost approximately \$100,000.00. So who would be responsible for the removal? He sent some ideas to Engineer Britton that will be reviewed with the Town Board. A couple of ideas would be a letter of credit or a bond in place to protect the Town. This would not affect individual homeowners just the solar panel farms.

Department Heads

- **Water-Sewer Superintendent** confirmed that the water tower will be back in service. There is an insulation issue to be discussed.
- **Highway Superintendent** reported that his department was doing some work on the bike path cleaning up a ditch in the area of the bike path but it had nothing to do with the bike path itself. He also reported that Wheatfield has a lift bucket and they were able to fix the Town's flag pole. Just another part of shared services that all the Town's are involved in.
- Assessor Kelli Coughlin reported that she has finalized the information that the County needs for the taxes. She also reported that she attended a class on Solar Panels. She also has a class scheduled to attend about critiquing an appraisal.

NEW BUSINESS

Supervisor Maerten explained that the Preliminary Budget presented during the Public Hearing had a few changes from the Budget that was posted to the website. The changes do not affect the bottom line but need to be passed and accepted by the Town Board.

He said they had a number of issues to work with regarding the three people retiring such as providing the money for training; working on other increases the Board can't control such

as health insurance and workman's compensation while trying to remain under the state's budget cap and they were successful in that.
