attorney for Phillips Lytle, and I represent Empire Pipeline, Inc. With me here tonight, I have a team of folks from the Empire/National Fuel team. We have a lot of information about some of the things we're going to discuss tonight. I'll just take a moment to make introductions.

I've got Mike Kasprzak, senior engineer with the project. Josh Wendt, project engineer. I've got Julie Bachan from our land group. I've got Ken Webster, in-house counsel. And I've got Pat Kelly from government relations.

We are here tonight for a public hearing on the proposed Pendleton compressor station in conjunction with site plan review by the Planning Board. If I may, I'd just like to do a broad overview and highlight some of the process we've been through with the Board.

To put the project in context, the Pendleton compressor station is part of a project we refer to as Northern Access 2016. Northern Access 2016 is about a half billion dollar project involving improvements to existing interstate pipeline facilities and infrastructure from Pennsylvania up

There are various components to the project. It includes a new pipeline from Northern

Pennsylvania to our existing compressor station in the Town of Elma in Western New York. We call that the Porterville compressor station. It's in the old hamlet of Porterville. We have a new interconnect station in the Town of Wales. That is so the new pipeline coming up from Pennsylvania can connect to the Tennessee pipeline. Tennessee pipeline serves eastern New York and New England, so some of the gas that comes up this way will head towards those markets.

There's a new compressor station and other improvements at Porterville. There is also a dehydration facility in Wheatfield. And, of course, this portion of the project which is the Pendleton compressor station.

Northern Access 2016 continues through an extensive FERC review process. FERC is the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. In conjunction with that review process, there have been more than a dozen public meetings over a two-year period. That

There have been numerous public mailings on the project all in conjunction with FERC which has exclusive authority over interstate gas line pipeline facilities such as the Pendleton compressor station.

In terms of the details of the project and what's proposed, this is the proposed project.

This is an area map. This is Beach Ridge Road, this is Town Line Road to the west. This is

Killian Road. The project is right off of Killian Road. It's an, approximately, 20 acre site in an existing farm field right now. The -- we've obviously submitted site plans to the Planning Board. This is the landscaping plan. Here's the site plan for the project. This has been on file with the Planning Board since last January.

The project itself entails two turbine powered compressors, each 11,107 horsepower. Those are these two improvements shown on the site plan.

They are each contained in sound-insulated

buildings so they will be fully enclosed. There are various additional buildings. There's a metering building, there's an odorizer. There's something we call the RTU, or remote terminal unit building. That building is basically all the electronics that allows the station to be monitored from afar.

There's an emergency generator on site.

There is a new access drive coming off of Killian.

And, of course, there's a small parking area. All within a fenced compound. This is the fenced compound. We've submitted a fairly detailed landscaping plan. And, again, our earlier discussions with the Planning Board, they were very clear, we ought to propose a very robust landscaping plan. And I think we've -- we've discussed that this is probably one of the most robust plans the Planning Board has ever seen. We are proposing a number of berms as well as a couple of hundred additional trees to be added to the site.

As I mentioned earlier, we're working on the Porterville compressor station. That was built by

20:06:18 National Fuel in the 1950s. And the trees on that 1 20:06:21 2 site have now matured and that facility is basically invisible to the community. You cannot 20:06:26 3 see it because it is completely surrounded by 20:06:29 4 20:06:32 well-groomed, well-grown trees. And, in fact, we 5 20:06:36 6 had a public hearing not too long ago in Elma for a use permit with the Town Board and a number of 20:06:40 people from the community commented that they had 20:06:42 no idea the facility was there. It's been there 20:06:44 for well over 60 years. And with the screening in 20:06:48 10 20:06:52 11 place, as it grows up over time people tend to forget they're there. Those are the highlights on 20:06:56 12 20:06:59 13 the landscaping plan and the site plan.

There have been a number of significant changes to this project as a result of community feedback. The first and probably the most important, this project was originally proposed for a residential area on Aiken Road. Based on community feedback at the FERC process, it was very clear that there was a lot of concern about putting this facility in a residential district. So Empire has moved it to a light industrial district on Killian.

In addition to moving it to an industrial 20:07:34 1 2 district, that addressed a couple of other concerns 20:07:36 we heard during the FERC process. It avoids the 20:07:39 3 need for some significant pipeline work by the 20:07:42 4 20:07:45 Frontier Chemical site. The need for that work 5 20:07:48 simply goes away by not having -- not being up by 6 20:07:52 Aiken Road. It allows for a decommissioning of an odorant station off of Aiken Road that exists now. 20:07:55 8 That odorant station is on the site plans, it's a 20:08:00 9 small building here, but that will be 20:08:03 10 20:08:06 11 decommissioned. In fact I believe, if I'm not mistaken, the building inspector has already issued 20:08:09 12 20:08:12 13 a demolition permit for that work. 20:08:15 14 Visual mitigations. One of the big concerns 20:08:19 15 we heard about the Pendleton compressor station 20:08:21 16 during the process was concerns about visual 20:08:24 17 impacts. So we've prepared a number of renderings 20:08:28 18 of what the facility will look like. First and 20:08:32 19 foremost, we've employed an agriculture design. This will look like barns and silos rather than an 20:08:36 20 20:08:40 21 industrial facility. 20:08:42 22 The photo renderings do a good job of

The first photo is taken from, this is from Killian Road to the west of the site. There is a hedge -- or a row of trees, a hedgerow, if you will, that's been in existence on that site for quite some time. That row of trees stays. That is preserved, that is protected. There's actually all wetlands in that area so that will not be disturbed. And what you see is looking to the east from Killian Road the facility will not be visible. So that tree line does a great job of screening the facility and, of course, we're going to maintain that.

This is a photo rendering of the site from Killian Road from the new access drive. So this would be right in front of the facility. This is that row of trees that I just mentioned. You can see, we've proposed two barn-like structures to house those compressor stations. And, again, those are fully designed with noise attenuation to minimize noise impacts to the community.

We have another rendering, if I'm not mistaken. Actually, we have a couple more. Let me

This, if I'm not mistaken, is a rendering from Town Line Road and the facility will not be visible from Town Line Road. That gives you a pretty good indication of what the facility view would be from Town Line Road of the facility.

We also took a rendering or did a rendering from just behind the facility. This is in the agricultural fields. It's an area we call the old air strip, and if you're familiar with that, it's kind of right behind our property. And, again, you can see, you will certainly see the buildings, they do look like barns and a silo, again, rather than an industrial appearing complex.

We've also taken a number of steps, again, based on some feedback, to minimize lighting at the site. And I just want to take a moment to run through the lighting plans. Again, we've provided all of this detail to the Planning Board as part of our submittals.

This is a rendering of what the facility would look like if there is something going on at night. And what do I mean by that? Normally the

facility will not be manned at night and nobody will be there and it will be dark, and I'll show you what that will look like in a moment. If there is something going on at the facility and we needed all the lights turned on, this is what it will look like. Your two barn structures and the additional structures in the back.

Just to show what that would be like, and what that does a nice job of demonstrating is that at the edge of the facility the lights spillage comes down to virtually zero. So it's dark sky compliant. We do need, sometimes, lighting at night but it will be a rare instance. More likely -- we'll go to this board. More likely it's gonna look like this, and this is what we call egress lighting. This is lighting that would be necessary for someone coming into the facility. It's far less than the full lighting scenario and really it just gives someone who's inside the facility ability to generally see their way around the site.

Again, we've done photometrics on that and showing minimal light spillage.

The last one we have, and this is the one that will be typical on a standard day, and this is when nobody's there. It's got -- we have minimal lighting on a couple of buildings. We call that unoccupied lighting. And, generally speaking, you will not see that from off site.

This facility, I should mention, the facility is manned during the day. It is not intended to be manned during the night. So basically we're talking say 8 to 4:30 weekdays somebody will be at the facility, but generally speaking, nobody will be there at night.

We've done -- I've talked already about the berms and the landscaping so I won't go over that again. Just kind of for everybody's benefit, a little explanation of the process we've been through with the Board.

We filed for sketch plan review on September 9th, 2015. It's been just over a year since we came, about a year and a week. Perhaps that's a record. I think we've been in Board review for quite some time. We worked through the sketch plan review process with the Board last fall. We filed

our full site plan application in January, and I do have that application here. Based on the sketch plan review, we were asked to provide an awful lot of detail about the facility. Specifically we were asked to backup a lot of our discussions about noise, storm water controls, wetlands, soil conditions, all documented as reports in this submittal.

The filing of that last January really kicked off a lot of feedback and dialogue with the Board. We received several requests for clarification and additional information. We received a number of comments from the Town engineer. We did additional submittals on February 16th, March 15th, April 1st, April 25th, and August 19th. Basically we have been at every Planning Board meeting and every work session, so twice a month, since I think last October. So we've spent an awful lot of time with the Board answering questions and going through the details of the information that's been provided.

The Board required extensive additional documentation throughout that process. The

information on wetlands, noise, emergency response, air emissions, storm water controls, and limitations on additional development at the site.

In terms of wetlands, I do want to just run through this quickly. This is a survey of the site. And this is the 20-acre parcel. This is that hedgerow of trees that I mentioned earlier. There are two wetlands that have been delineated on the site, none will be impacted. Neither of those wetlands will be impacted by the project. At this point, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has given preliminary approval to the wetland delineation that was done to this site. So we do have two wetlands, we will avoid them completely.

Let's see, in terms of other issues, the

Board has indicated to us that it is considering a

number of conditions on terms of site plan

approval. These include that the specific

materials of construction and design identified in

our noise study shall be utilized in the

construction of the compressor station. That

Empire shall conduct post-construction noise tests

as required by FERC. And our noise testing, just

so everybody has a sense, FERC has a limit of 55 1 decibels at the nearest sensitive noise receptor which is the closest house. We've done a fairly comprehensive noise assessment of the new facility. We've determined not only will we -- will we be 5 well below the 55 decibels, our noise study predicts that background noise or noise from the facility will increase background 0 to .14 decibels. And it's pretty well-established that one decibel is barely perceptible to the human ear. The noise from this facility will be barely perceptible to the human ear based on our noise 20:16:58 12 study. And, again, we will be doing post-construction noise tests as required by FERC.

> We've already been asked to prove, considered providing, and we will provide, a PE certification, a professional engineer certification to the Town every five years that the storm water management ponds for the facility have been inspected and are functioning properly. Prior to placing the facility in service, we must conduct training and orientation for local emergency response providers. We will, of course, do that.

1 And we also have agreed to impose a deed restriction which limits aboveground development on areas of the site that will not be developed as part of the compressor station.

After the site is developed, we will do a survey of the areas that are undeveloped. to that study, we're currently estimating that undeveloped area to be approximately 11.5 acres. So a little bit more than half of the site will be permanently restricted from development.

The last thing I want to mention before we go to public comments is project reviews and status with FERC.

In July, FERC, again Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which oversees this project, issued the environmental assessment which determined no significant adverse impacts associated with Northern Access 2016, which of course includes the proposed Pendleton compressor station. We are now moving towards issuance of a certificate of necessity, and that is expected in late October, early November.

With that, we'd very much like to hear from

MS. CIEPIELA: Envision two 11,000 turbine compressor stations put on Killian Road next to a qun club with 200 houses within a one-mile radius and less than half a mile away from Frontier Chemical Superfund site. What is wrong with this picture?

The compressor station itself sounds great on paper. Designed and tested in California in temperatures between 50 and 80 degrees Fahrenheit. What happens if we have a winter proposed for this

February, like two years ago in February, 40 degrees below zero with wind-chills. Basically I've read many places that compressor stations emit a lot more benzene, methane, other chemicals when the temperature falls below zero, which it does in Western New York, especially on Killian Road.

Last August we had -- one day we had over seven inches of rain. That whole area on Killian Road was flooded for several days. How is the compressor station designed to protect itself against that amount of water?

Now, envision hunting season in November when hunters are shooting deer all around the area. On Killian Road the sun is shining, meanwhile West Seneca, which is the home of National Fuel, is having one to two feet of snow an hour. What happens if some hunters accidently cause some damage to the compressor station? The compressor station goes into their blowdown uncontrollably. It is -- after-hours it's unmanned. Our response team in Pendleton, I know because I went to an early response thing, cannot respond. The ground starts vibrating. It's less than a half mile away

1 from the Frontier Chemical Superfund site. All those hazardous wastes start moving possibly causing explosions. Is this a safe place to put the compressor station?

Also, we talked about human beings, what about animals? I live in Beach Ridge Road, there's cows, there's chickens, organic farms. There's Leo Brenon's right across from the proposed compressor station for topsoil. Those chemicals are going to cause -- first off, they're not going to be able to call anything organic in this area. How is it going to affect the cows and their milk production? How is it going to affect the chickens that we eat? How is it going to protect the eggs I buy on the street which are considered organic? So to me is this a good location? No. We have a lot of areas that are zoned heavy industrial, much better sites.

He talked about the noise and said the noise is 20:23:41 14 going to be less, but can people in Pendleton tolerate the FERC process that they have a year to be on the compliance on noise before they have to do something about it? So he's making all these guarantees. He said the lighting will just be on rarely. I don't know what his definition of rare is. And will he guarantee rare? To me rare is like zero to one that that's going to have that. The other thing is the building is

unsightly. I don't know, you don't really have a

farm. You're calling it -- you're going to have to 20:24:08 1 2 send out the message it's a farm. We farm soybean 20:24:10 and hay in Pendleton, we don't farm natural gas 20:24:15 3 here. We don't -- how many farmers do a blowdown 20:24:18 4 20:24:21 and put the methane gas, formaldehyde, and other 5 20:24:26 6 chemicals into the air? I would say probably none. 20:24:29 So this is very misleading. It's an illusion with a farm billing. As to say it's out of sight, you 20:24:32 8 know, people are going to drive by and think it's a 20:24:34 9 farm, kids are going to go over running there and 20:24:37 10 20:24:39 11 things like that and who knows. And they said on other properties, Mike Cooperstock has shown that 20:24:41 12 20:24:46 13 they actually break into it and they're hunting 20:24:46 14 around the property and other locations. They're 20:24:49 15 already hunting here right next to the gun club. 20:24:52 16 That's what Dave Notaro points out all the time. health impact, we're concerned about the employees of National Fuel. And Adam was proud to say this is gonna be unoccupied. That's great because when the blowdown comes and all the emissions come out, there's not a National Fuel/Empire person there. It's just the Pendleton residents.

Now, I moved out here because it's farmland and residential. It has clean air. So, right now, until National Fuel moves in and they said, well, we're allowed to have multiple blowdowns to get the methane out of the pipeline. FERC says it's okay. It's okay because they're over in Washington, D.C., It's okay. But they're not gonna do any recycling. They don't have to do a blowdown and put it out into the air, they have a choice. They haven't chosen that choice yet. It's too expensive. Lives are okay, lives are expendable? Any soldiers in this room know what I'm talking about.

They could recycle the blowdown, Adam. You know that. It's a little bit extra money.

Like I said, vines are growing up through the trees. I FERC'd on this as well. You might have caught it. But I don't think 250, maybe 300 trees are going to be adequate to protect any of our vegetation that's there. Right by, and the Wales compressor, the replacement of those trees, because in addition to those trees that you did plant to offset that site plan, which is probably something much designed like what you did for them, their tree line is also dying from all the emissions. The trees that are on the property of that farm that was right next door, those trees are dying as well. Those are the homeowner's trees and because of the emissions they're getting killed off. So something to consider, maybe you should take a look back at that.

In addition, I am certainly a gardener, I do love grass, and I see that you have some very nice grasses in your pictures. Are those grasses absolutely going to be in that site plan?

My other question is certainly I would like to know if the trees will be replaced in perpetuity throughout the entire time, and I would like that in writing as well.

One thing that I don't think is really being brought up is the vibroacoustic disorder that is associated with compressor stations. For those of you who don't know, it's a low acoustic vibration I suppose that really affects the body. It actually causes psychosis, you can find lots of studies associated with it, and I'll leave it at that. Something that some people aren't considering.

In regard to the hunting, 365 days a year is what Dave Notaro has reported based on New York State hunting laws. Certainly he can hunt 24 hours a day, depending on the season, and we know that there are many a night, am I correct when I say coyotes at night? So certainly when it is in that

dark lumination, I would like to know how they are going to protect that kind of club and the exposed aboveground pipes. Those are not going to be bulletproof from my expectation and from my reading.

I'd also like to make something else known, especially to the residents. The hydrostatic testing of the pipes where they are going to withdraw I think it's, what, a 140,000 gallons of water to put into the pipelines for 24 hours to test to see if there's any leaks. What they're doing is they're taking water out of Bull Creek and then they're going to put it into pipes, and then they're going to discharge that water and all the sediment that is in that Bull Creek back on site.

Many of you probably don't know that the hazardous waste site called Frontier Chemical Superfund site with 65 plus chemicals including radioactive waste, chromium six, and many other toxins, the sediments have never -- that creek has never been fully cleaned and certainly the sediments are in there. So certainly they will be discharging all of that water on site. And I

certainly hope that the Town is looking into that hydrostatic testing and where they're discharging all of that contaminated soil and water.

One more thing. I have not read, and I have read the entire EA top -- or front to end, it was riveting, I have not seen where they have -- you have not mentioned that there's a recapture system. So I would like to know where that is stated because I have not seen it. I've heard that you're going to put that on, but certainly that has not been addressed in the EA.

That's all I have. Thank you.
