A regular meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Pendleton was held at the Town Hall, 6570 Campbell Blvd., Pendleton, NY, on the 8th day of October 2018 at 7:00 p.m.

#### **PUBLIC HEARING**

Supervisor Maerten opened the Public Hearings at 6:55 p.m.

The notices for the Public Hearings were published in the Lockport Union Sun & Journal on September 26, 2018 and on the Town's website.

# PUBLIC HEARING #1 – PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO TOWN CODE §247-23 ACCESS TO PUBLIC STREET AND TOWN CODE §247-24 CONTIGUOUS PARCELS

The purpose of the hearing is to receive public input for the proposed amendments to Town Code §247-23 Access to Public Street and Town Code §247-24 Contiguous Parcels. Supervisor Maerten read the current codes and read the proposed amended Town Code §247-23 and stated that Town Code §247-24 would be deleted in its entirety.

Wolfgang Buechler, Chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals had concerns regarding how this change might affect a previous case that had been brought before the Board of Appeals. Supervisor Maerten stated that he believed this current amendment would only affect commercial property. Building Inspector Masters was not in attendance to answer specific questions. Mr. Buechler presented Supervisor Maerten with additional items to consider regarding this matter. After a brief discussion Supervisor Maerten recommended postponing the vote until further notice.

There were no other public questions or comments.

Motion made by Councilman Leible, seconded by Councilman Fischer, to close the Public Hearing #1 at 7:01 p.m. Motion carried.

# PUBLIC HEARING #2 – ESTABLISHMENT OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT AREA FOR HERITAGE LANDINGS

Supervisor Maerten read the details of the public hearing. The purpose of this public hearing is to receive public input for the establishment of Sewer Improvement Area for Heritage Landings. Engineer Dave Britton gave a brief summary of why the establishment of this sewer improvement area is necessary. The Town Board created a sanitary sewer district for this area in 2014. Since then the applicant returned and amended their final plot changing lot configurations and boundaries. Earlier this year the Town Board dissolved the sanitary sewer district. The current proposal is to create a sewer improvement area for Heritage Landings to coincide with the rest of the town's sewer improvement areas.

There was one question asked from the public that Engineer Britton was able to address. There were no other public questions or comments.

Motion made by Councilman Leible, seconded by Councilman Fischer, to close the Public Hearing #2 at 7:04 p.m. Motion carried.

# PUBLIC HEARING #3 - AMENDMENTS TO STORMWATER DISTRICT #4

Supervisor Maerten read the details of the public hearing. The purpose of this public hearing is to receive public input for the proposed amendments to Stormwater District #4 for Heritage Landings. Engineer Britton explained that this proposal is to amend the Stormwater district's previous approval to match up with the subdivisions new boundaries. Engineer Britton answered all questions asked during this public hearing.

Motion made by Councilman Leible, seconded by Councilman Ostrowski, to close the Public Hearing #3 at 7:08 p.m. Motion carried.

### **COMMUNICATIONS**

Town Clerk Maurer reported that the 2019 Tentative Budget was filed in the Town Clerk's office on September 17, 2018. Copies of the 2019 Tentative Budget were also delivered to each of the Town Board members at the first Budget Session on September 17, 2018.

Town Clerk Maurer mentioned that there was an article in the Lewiston-Porter Sentinel reporting that the Town of Lewiston is looking into putting in a park like Mason's Mission. She also reminded the Board and audience about the Pendleton Community Faire and Expo that is scheduled for Saturday, October 13, 2018 at the Pendleton Center United Methodist Church.

# PUBLIC REMARKS/COMMENTS ON AGENDA ITEMS

A resident commented on a letter that he had presented to the Town Board on September 24, 2018 and asked for a response to that letter.

There were no other public remarks or comments.

#### **ROUTINE BUSINESS**

Town Clerk Maurer reported that the authorization for Abstract #19 was delayed due to the holiday. It will be presented to the Board for authorization at the October 22, 2018 Work Session.

# **OTHER REPORTS**

**Supervisor Maerten** also reported that the tax collected for August 2018 was \$125,191.11. This is an increase of \$8,706.61 when compared with August 2017. The year to date received is \$1,054.664.10, which is an increase of \$38,634.90 from 2017.

**Councilman Leible** reported that the offices for both judges were painted recently. He has scheduled an appointment to inspect and clean the furnace. He is also researching prices for a new vehicle for the Building Department.

**Councilman Fischer** read the Highway Department's report for September. He reported that the Highway Department mowed ditches, chipped brush, hauled two pieces of equipment for auction and flushed six plugged culvert pipes with the Sewer Jet. They also checked and repaired road signs, worked on the Veterans' monument, removed fill at the playground making room for new equipment, mowed lawns on Town property and repaired trucks and equipment as needed. The Highway Department shared services in September with the towns of Wheatfield, Cambria and Wilson. Councilman Fischer also told the group about his recent trip with the Boy Scouts to Washington, D.C.

**Councilman Leible** asked the Town Board for approval to conduct an audit and inventory of the Water/Sewer Department.

**Councilman Ostrowski** reported on the recent visit of Sylvester Pendleton Clarke, the great-grandson of the town's founder, Sylvester Pendleton Clarke. A reception was held and attended by many residents. Councilman Ostrowski presented a proclamation to Mr. Clarke. Town Clerk Maurer added that Mr. Clarke stated that he had a wonderful time visiting the Town Hall, Fricano Elementary School, the Historical Society, the Clarke cemetery, Uncle G's Ice Cream and the Ship 'N Shore Restaurant, which his great-grandfather was the first inn keeper of. Mr. Clarke mentioned that he would like to come back for the Town's centennial. Councilman Ostrowski thanked all who attended.

Councilman Graham read the Building Department's monthly report for September for Building Inspector Masters, who was absent. The Building Department issued 21 building permits and five contractor's licenses. Twenty on site visual inspections were completed and several violations were issued. There are 30 outstanding violations remaining to date with several residents required to appear in court for various infractions. Councilman Graham also read the Water/Sewer Department Report as Superintendent Argo was also absent. In September, the Sewer Department completed 14 regular time sewer calls, repaired six pressure sewer breaks, completed two new home sewer taps and updated one total grinder pump. They also installed a new Omni-Site Dialoguer for the Pendale Pump Station and cleaned out four Niagara County Sewer District pump stations. The Water Department conducted nine final water reads, completed seven sold home water/sewer compliance inspections, installed two new home water meters and tapped water services for three new homes. Additionally, the Water Department inspected two open sewer and water trenches and completed 39 underground utility stakeout requests. Councilman Graham congratulated Building Inspector Masters on the birth of his new son. He also wanted to recognize Pets Alive on Campbell Boulevard. He recently adopted a dog from this rescue and said that they are doing a great job.

**Attorney Joerg** stated that he has been working on the Article 7 tax assessment review proceedings. The four big properties in town all have challenges. These properties include the hotel on Transit Road [Hampton Inn], the property on Donner Road [previously Mac's Antique Auto Parts], KeyBank on Transit Road and Tan-Tara Golf Course. He has been involved in pre-trials with the courts and attorneys which has been very time consuming but is trying to get these matters resolved in good manner for the town.

**Engineer Britton** gave updates on the Fisk Road project and the portable generator project.

**Budget Officer Bergman** reported that he has been working on the tentative budget. He stated that he and the Board have had meetings already. They will be continuing with the budget sessions that have been scheduled.

### **DEPARTMENT HEADS**

**Highway Superintendent Stowell** spoke about the drainage issue at the church on Campbell Boulevard and Bear Ridge Road. He has been working on this with Engineer Britton. A lengthy discussion took place between Superintendent Stowell, Supervisor Maerten and Attorney Joerg regarding this subject. Superintendent Stowell also informed the Board that they have received \$6,000.00 for a chipper and \$1,800.00 for a pick-up truck with a blown engine from the live auction.

**Assessor Coughlin** reported that she had just attended the annual Assessor's conference where she took some classes pertaining to exemption programs and market influence. She also attended a lecture on solar farms, has been getting things ready for the tax levy and is trying to keep up with final inspections with Building Inspector Masters.

It was decided that he will research whether the cost of the extra patrols is earning enough revenue to pay for the cost of services before scheduling the additional patrols.
