A regular meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Pendleton was held at the Town Hall, 6570 Campbell Blvd., Pendleton, NY, on the 13th day of May 2019 at 7:00 p.m. A Public Hearing was scheduled for 6:55 p.m.

PUBLIC HEARING

Supervisor Maerten opened the Public Hearing at 6:58 p.m. The notice for the Public Hearing was published in the Lockport Union Sun & Journal on April 18, 2019 and on the Town's website.

REPLACEMENT FEES FOR DAMAGED WATER METERS AND ELECTRONICS

The purpose of the hearing is to receive public input for the proposed increase to replacement fees for damaged water meters and electronics.

Supervisor Maerten explained that this proposal reflects the increase in the cost of replacement parts for water meters. The replacement fees will only be imposed upon residents whose meters were damaged as to what could be described as preventable.

There were no public questions or comments.

Town Clerk Maurer also read a letter from the Lockport Public Library thanking the Town for the funds received for 2019.

Supervisor Maerten welcomed Jim Sobczyk and Shirley Raub, of the Pendleton Community and Business Association, to the meeting. They were in attendance to present the Board with a check from Niagara County for \$2,500.00. The Town Board voted at a previous meeting to match this award as an annual grant for business promotion in the Town of Pendleton. This year's funding will go towards a shelter that will be placed at the trailhead of the Town's bike path on Campbell Boulevard.

Next, Supervisor Maerten presented Charles Langlois with the Sylvester Pendleton Clarke Citation for Community Service recognizing his many years of service to the Town of Pendleton. Mr. Langlois was a member of the Recreation Committee from 2009 -2019 and served as the Director of the Summer Recreation program for many years. His dedication to the youth of our community is appreciated by all.

OTHER REPORTS

Supervisor Maerten reported that tax collected for March 2019 was \$147,310.06. This is an increase of \$4,441.51 when compared with March 2018. The year to date received was \$380,629.91 which is an increase of \$418.70 from 2018.

Supervisor Maerten thanked Councilman Leible for attending the veterans' luncheon, on May 7, 2019, to present proclamations on behalf of the Town Board recognizing two remaining World War II veterans living in town. [See proclamations below]. He also reported that the Planning Board, Town Engineer Dave Britton and retired Planning Board Administrative Assistant John Lavrich, are working together on updates to the Town Code for zoning, drainage, excavations and fill. He will provide updates to this project as they become available.

Councilman Fischer read the Highway Department's report for April. During the month the Highway Department chipped brush, repaired and installed bubblers at various locations, finished brush hogging the bike path between Meyer and Killian and cleaned ditches. They worked on drainage, helped with the Veterans' monument, began to prepare the park and fields for the summer sports teams, used the street sweeper in the subdivisions and attended CPR training. The Town also shared services with the Town of Cambria's Highway Department. Councilman Fischer also read the Water/Sewer Report. In April the Sewer Department had 23 regular and nine overtime calls. They repaired four sewer breaks, completed duplex and life station checks, rebuilt E-One pumps and replaced two sewer boxes. They also painted the old restrooms at the park and shut off water at the old driving range on Transit Road. The Water Department replaced one water box, completed the quarterly meter reading and seven sold home inspections. The Water Department also completed 127 stakeouts and three final water reads. Craig Walter and Jonathon Berry completed a two-day course for Grade D Water Licenses. Councilman Leible also stated that he completed the Wendelville Fire Company's Length of Service Award Program (LOSAP) audit and attended a recent Pendleton Farm and Homes Day meeting. He reported that things are going well and that they are looking for volunteers to help with this event.

Councilman Ostrowski informed the Board that he received a response from the Amherst Traffic Safety Board (ATSB) regarding the requested Stop Ahead Advanced Warning sign at the intersection of New Road and Tonawanda Creek Road. The ATSB has approved this request and it will be installed within the next couple weeks. He also reported that he has spoken with Legislator Nemi regarding enhancing the existing signs at this intersection and possibly installing a solar powered stop sign with the assistance of Niagara County. Councilman Ostrowski gave his condolences to the Leible family for their recent loss and informed everyone that the articles for the summer newsletter are due on May 25th.

Councilman Graham read the Building Department report for Building Inspector Thompson who was absent. In April, the Building Department issued 48 building permits and 26 contractor licenses. Thirty-two building permits were completed and 74 visual inspections were conducted. There were 11 violation notices sent with nine still outstanding. The Building Department has been addressing usual springtime problems from property maintenance and drainage issues. He also reported that construction is in full swing. Bobcat of Buffalo has begun construction and the Holiday Inn Express will be starting site work soon. Councilman Graham also read the Assessor's Monthly Report in her absence. The report stated that the Tentative Roll became available on May 1, 2019 and change of assessment notices were mailed out. The Assessor attended the IDA public hearing for the Holiday Inn Express and has continued the process of scanning blue prints. Also noted was that Grievance Day is May 28th from 3 p.m. until 8 p.m. Councilman Graham thanked the Highway Department employees for striping the soccer fields.

Attorney Joerg reported that he has been working on the Fisk Road bid specs with Engineer Britton.

Engineer Britton highlighted some items on his monthly report. The Fisk Road bid announcement was published today, May 13, 2019. It will also be published on Avalon Planroom of Buffalo [https://www.avalonbuff-planroom.com/jobs/3621/details/highway-rehabilitation-of-fisk-road]. The bid opening is scheduled for June 4, 2019 at 2:00 p.m. He also stated that he and Superintendent Stowell have been investigating the drainage issue on Tonawanda Creek Road. He provided the Board with a couple of different options for this repair. Mr. Britton also commented on the Bear Ridge Solar Project stating that the draft stipulation comments are due soon and that there will be a meeting at the Wendelville Fire Hall on Thursday, May 16th.

Budget Officer Bergman reported that all of the journal entries are complete and 2018 is "in the books".

Town Clerk Maurer reported that the Water/Sewer Monthly Report indicated that the total received for the month of April was \$2,321.87. She also reported that registration for the Summer Recreation Program began on May 1, 2019 and has been going smoothly. Registration will be accepted until May 31st without a late fee. Late registrations will be accepted until June 7th with an additional \$100.00 fee. Mrs. Maurer attended the New York State Town Clerks' Association Annual Conference in Syracuse, NY at the beginning of May and also stated that she is in the process of centralizing the collection of payments for all departments, accepting credit card payments for all departments and adding online payments in the near future.

NEW BUSINESS

Town Clerk Maurer presented information to the Board about Sustainable Tomorrows (ST), a nonprofit organization, that can evaluate the Town's utility payments. The Town will receive 50% of all refunds, credits, and reductions found for electricity/gas and water/sewage costs. Many municipalities, including Niagara County, have already used ST to reduce their utility costs and obtain refunds due to them. There is no upfront or annual cost for these services.

RESOLVED, that in the event the full federal and non-federal share costs of the project exceeds the amount appropriated above, the Pendleton Town Board shall convene as soon as possible to appropriate said excess amount immediately upon the notification by the New York State Department of Transportation therefore, and it is further
