## FROM THE SUPERVISOR'S DESK

A recent Buffalo News article focused on the growth and decline of cities and towns in Western New York and despite the wide-spread population decline and stagnation locally, Pendleton ranked second in population growth (by percentage), only surpassed by the Town of Clarence. You need look no further than the Town Hall or Public Works building to see proof of this growth and the effects on our town's government. Growth brings increased demands on all areas of local government, especially public works. However, despite the increased need for services, growth also means a lot of good news to report, as we have great people doing great things in Pendleton.

The Town Park has become an increasingly busy place and ongoing improvements there continue. The Town has been working with Jason Evchich, founder of Mason's Mission, on planning an important next phase of investment that will include remodeling the current restroom facilities and the addition of two family rooms that will be accessible to all. Additional paving in the park will continue, as well as construction of a limited access route to the pavilions. Much of the planned work is being covered by grant funding which Senator Ortt was instrumental in arranging for the Town. Much needed drainage work in the park was completed this year also, with plans to continue additional work in the future.

At the Town Hall, one of the busiest areas is the Building Department. It has been a struggle for the Town Board to find key personnel for this department with the experience, temperament, and stamina needed to handle the demands related to building inspection and code enforcement. Some may have noticed the changing of name plates at the door to this department due to the lack of qualifications needed for a leader in the Building Department. Fortunately, the Town Board has finally found quality local talent to provide the leadership necessary for a town as busy as Pendleton.

Recently Ron Diedrich came on-board as the fulltime Building Inspector & Code Enforcement officer and he is joined part-time by Joe Follendorf. Ron is a long-time town resident with decades of building experience and Joe brings great talents from his years in law enforcement. Both gentlemen have jumped in and done an amazing job in a short period of time, putting this department back on the right path. We all rely on consistent and uniform enforcement of the Town Code and all applicable building codes, ensuring safety, protecting property rights, and maintaining the pleasant appearance of our town.

Another large effort that is ongoing is the evaluation and updating of the Town Code. There are many changes necessitated by the changing times and probably

just as many updates that should have been addressed many years ago. Retired Planning Board Administrative Assistant John Lavrich is leading this task and updates will be addressed throughout the coming months by the Town Board. John is doing an amazing job and it seems like every time I send him an idea, his response is that he already thought of it and took care of it. In this situation and many

others, we rely on the unique talents and experience of many dedicated people and thank all who help in even the smallest way to keep our town moving forward.

As the signs of the end of summer begin to appear, there are two things that are certainly popping up in Town employee emails: unsolicited ads for Halloween and budget planning requests. The Town has consistently maintained tax levy increases below the New York State tax cap, which on a \$1.36 million tax levy for 2019 means a maximum increase of \$65,000 for 2020. This increase could easily be consumed by yearly increases in personnel costs, which means barely maintaining the status quo. Fortunately, sales tax revenues have returned to a more reasonable level after several years of drastic decreases. As the Town Board moves through this year's budget process, with the help of Budget Officer Don Bergman, a focus on conservative financial decisions will continue.

There are also many positive things to mention, as too much time focused on finances might convey the idea that nothing exciting and noteworthy is happening. Recently the Town Board recognized Chester Domagala, a long-time Town resident and one of the few remaining World War II veterans in Town. Despite the best information we had earlier this year, we missed Mr. Domagala when the Town Board recognized two other veterans. Thank you, Chet, and all of our town's veterans for your service.

We all also owe a big thank you to all involved with the Town's 3rd annual Farm and Home Days. Many people donated time and resources to this endeavor and I'm sure the committee is looking for help for 2020's celebration. This summer also saw the long awaited reconstruction of Fisk Road and opening of the last section of the Canal Trail in Pendleton. The Town is currently working on grant funding for the remaining section of the Town's trail, so hopefully that trail will be continuous through Town also. It is amazing the amount of use all the trails in Town are getting and it's nice to have such recreational opportunities so close to home.

Another area of importance that I will mention is related to National Grid and the company's commitment to service in Pendleton. I've received multiple inquiries in recent years related to a perceived issue with increased electrical outages and an additional problem related to signal lights on Campbell Boulevard all be connected on the same circuit. To make a long story short, I commend National Grid for their efforts in researching and addressing these issues. By the time you read this, National Grid will have made multiple system improvements that will limit and contain outages and also address concerns related to intersection safety during outages. Credit goes to those who deserve it, so thanks go to National Grid for their ongoing commitment and collaboration with the Town of Pendleton.

A final item that's important to those who live in the Aiken Road area, and also have the stamina to read this far through the newsletter, is a concern that goes back many years. As recently as this past June, the Wendelville Fire Company was dispatched multiple times during a twelve hour period, including one call to the Starpoint School District, for the strong smell of natural gas. This is noteworthy as National Fuel Gas Corporation has a natural gas odorant injection facility near Aiken Road, on one of the company's pipeline corridors. Since that time I have met with company representatives and I'm told that the events in June are not a result of any malfunction or activity on the part of National Fuel. However, since the odor was detected over a distance measured in miles, I'm a bit skeptical and continuing my hunt for the culprit responsible for this situation. I include this information as this is a safety issue for a large section of the Town and it's an important matter that cannot be dropped.

With all of this being said, thank you for reading these updates. If it makes you feel any better, I actually had to delete a few items I was going to include, as this would probably have added another page. But, as you can tell by the theme of this article, our town is a busy place with a lot going on. I hope you all have an enjoyable fall and a great start to a new school year (kids and parents included). Joel

## THE WATER/SEWER BILLING DEPARTMENT

First things first, I want to give a huge shout out to all who helped put together our 3<sup>nd</sup> annual Pendleton Farm and Home Days! The amount of work that goes into this event is never ending, and being fortunate enough to watch the set-up from start to finish is just amazing! Thankfully the weather did cooperate, for the most part, and both days were a huge success, with an amazing fireworks display to end the event. Great job everyone!

Well, here it is the last week of August and it looks like summer is going to be hanging around a while longer. The weather reports say that September is going to be warmer than normal this year. This sure is going to be nice since it seemed like our cold, rainy spring was never going to end, but what a nice summer we've had since it turned around. I sure hope we are going to have a nice fall this year. It seems like over the past few years we have gone from summer to winter with no easing into the frigid temperatures.

I am expecting October water bills to be pretty normal this year, even though we did not get a lot of rain this summer, the ground was so wet from the rainy spring that we didn't need to begin watering our lawns and gardens so early (the consumption period for your October water bill reflects water used in July, August & September). Remember that when you compare your water consumptions you must compare billing period to billing period (ex. Oct., 2015 with Oct., 2016; Oct., 2016 with Oct., 2017 and so forth) not previous bill to current bill.

I have been very busy getting ready for the upcoming levy. Remember that there will be a \$100.00 surcharge for any account that is unpaid as of 4:00, Friday, September 20, 2019. Letters went out on August 21, 2019 if this applied to you. I noticed that a lot of water bills have been coming back to me this year. Water bills do not get forwarded, so if your mailing address changes you need to notify me as soon as possible. This includes phone numbers too, we need your phone number in case of an emergency (i.e. broken water lines, sewer breaks, water being shut at the road, etc.) so please contact me if your phone number changes.

#### PLEASE REMEMBER THAT THE TOWN OF PENDLETON DOES NOT MAKE ADJUSTMENTS FOR SPRINKLER SYSTEMS OR THE FILLING OF SWIMMING POOLS.

- \* Billing cycles occur in January, April, July and October.
- \* Water bills are mailed out by the last Friday of the billing month.
- \* If you do not receive a bill by the end of the first week of the following month please contact the billing department at 625-8833, ext. 111.
- \* For your convenience there is a lockbox located in the foyer at the back entrance to the Town Hall.
- \* If you pay online please allow **10 business days** for mailing.

If you are selling your home please contact the Water & Sewer Department at 625-8033, as soon as possible to schedule a mandatory water/sewer line inspection. YOU MUST HAVE YOUR WATER & SEWER LINES INSPECTED BEFORE YOU CLOSE ON YOUR HOUSE !!! There is a \$50.00 fee for the inspection. If any repairs need to be made, there may be additional fees involved. If you are purchasing a new home please contact our office ASAP to set up an account.

If you are leaving temporarily (i.e. Vacation) please consider prepaying your account to avoid late fees. Again, water bills are not forwarded.

## **TOWN HISTORIAN NEWS**

"Hello" my fellow wonderful Pendleton residents!! I pray your summer was eventful, safe, relaxing, and memorable, and your autumn will be filled with the pleasant sights, smells, sounds, and tastes of fall in this beautiful area. I thought it to be a grand idea to reflect on a fairly famous place in our town. I was unfamiliar with it until a local business owner, Joe Panepento, purchased this property a couple years ago. What was it and what did it mean to this community? Firstly, it was a canal side hotel in our town in the 1850's, and is located at the current address of 6542 Bear Ridge Road between Irish and Feigle Roads, close to West Canal Road (pictures at right). The Sulphur Springs House, as it was called, was built by Reuben Fuller and Marshall Martin in 1850, and was long kept by Truman Nichols. The merchants were Martin Woock, Mathias Donner (who was also postmaster), and Jacob Blum. The hotel keeper was Anthony Roskopf. It was designed as a settler and canal traveler rest stop, and got its name from a supposed sulphur spring nearby. It is unknown whether the spring was actually on the property or if the hotel offered the sulphur water as a healing aid for bathing and drinking. However, it is known that medicinal cures could be found here for people traveling along the canal. A quote from the book "Pharmacy on the Niagara Frontier" by Laurence Lockie states "...in Pendleton... there was at one time a Sulphur Springs Hotel where people came to see the curative powers of the (mineral) springs. The residents of the hotel purchased their own remedies from the general stores in the vicinity." Was this the case OR, as former town historian Martin Gilbert thought, was it just a "watering hole", a regular bar for local folks and travelers alike?! Regardless, it is still a fascinating piece of our town history, worth mentioning to all of you, and very awesome that Mr. Panepento and his wife Tonya, as well as his commercial exterior maintenance company, have worked to renovate it into their home and preserve history.

#### **HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT**

Hello, After the early very rainy start, it ended up being a beautiful summer. This ended up being our busiest summer yet. We got started with some much-needed drainage work at 2 of the park shelters. Much more is needed near the volleyball courts that we'll try to fit in at some point. Decisions are still in "the works" for a new ADA compliant bathroom facility. This is also very important as the new playground growth, along with the town as a whole, has changed everything. Mason's Mission is also talking about adding a splash pad area to the park as well. Anyone looking to help can contact them or the Town Board. Those of you who haven't seen the new playground I suggest you try to get over to the Town Park and see the "growth."

FISK ROAD: As of this being the 3rd week in August, I can tell you we are really looking good. The contractor is starting the 2 1/2" of binder today after a LOT of preparation, including a lot of prep under the road base, drainage work, and of course widening the road itself with 4' paved shoulders on each side. We have joined in with the contractor to help speed the entire process and close in some of the drainage ditches that are deep and outside the "right of way." We also found some water leaks and repaired them as well and worked with the contractor moving several hydrants. At this point I am very happy with the progress and by the time this newsletter is delivered I bet the majority of the work will be completed. As always, I'll expect some problems that will need to be addressed, but again, at this point I am very happy with this major project.

I am asking Fisk Road residents to keep an eye out for large trucks driving down the road. This road, like most, will be rated for 10 tons. Please get any info you can on trucks that are overweight and call the Sheriff so tickets will be issued to try to stop this as it damages our roads.

We also had a very successful July 4th celebration as the early rainy season let up just in time. For the 3rd consecutive year the Pendleton Farm & Home Days event took place in mid-August. I thought it was a huge success. The reasons for its success start with the Co-Chairs, Denuelle Meyer and Joanne Zimmerman. Their planning for this event was overwhelming with items to be dealt with and they have done a great job all 3 years. That being said, the event could not have gone on without ALL of the other VOLUNTEERS that helped prepare for it as well. If you couldn't get here you missed a great event. Help is needed every year so, if you are available, contact them for the next event planning. I also have to thank Mother Nature for the



beautiful weather for the 2-day event. She let me off the "hook" this year for my past curse words for her.

Last but far from least, I have to thank my crew, from my guys to the girls in the office, for ALL their hard work not only for this event but for their year-round dedication to the Town of Pendleton. They put up with a lot of stress from me and handle it pretty well. THANK YOU to them.

As far as road work goes, we did apply oil & stone to Town roads: Mapleton, Aiken North, and most of Killian; that totaled approximately \$80,000. I believe it's a short-term success in sealing the roads. With the remaining \$145,000 I plan on Micro-sealing Meyer Road, Old Orchard Sub-division, and Killian Road Hill, along with crack-sealing and patching a variety of other roads before Fall gets too far along. Next year I will evaluate roads after the winter but I am looking towards Dunnigan and Oakwood near the top of that list. With all of this work and a small work force we fell behind on some other work, such as mowing and cleaning our ditches among others. This Fall with Mother Nature cooperating we will try to brush hog our off-road drainage ditches. Thanks to those of you that reminded me we have "missed" some the last few years, we will try to get them all mowed this year. Please check and remove anything you might have in our drainage easements so our tractors can get through.

As in the past we try to STOP chipping brush from July 1st until Labor Day. This is the most important time to work on our roads and work together with all our towns in Niagara County. None of us could survive without working together. Many of you have seen the different colored trucks helping us; we help them as well. I do understand the issue especially with the Ash trees and will continue to chip brush as much as possible which is generally getting through the town every 2 weeks. Remember to place your brush to the curbside off of the road, butt ends out, and easy to grab rows. If you toss a "bonfire" pile out to the road, we won't chip it.

I look forward to this Fall to the arrival of our new Tandem Axle dump truck. This is going to be the first new tandem in over a dozen years. It will help us maintain our roads much more efficiently. Thanks to our Town Board for listening and understanding our needs in the Public Works Department. The truck price came in at approximately \$225,000.

Also, a Thank You to our seasonal workers Jason and Michael Donner, and Thomas Dahlman for helping us keeping the parks buildings & grounds in good shape. Gerry Freatman is also a big help and he "sticks around" a little longer as the others head off to college. Thanks, and Good Luck to them all.
