#### From the Supervisor's Desk...

Unbelievably fall is approaching, meaning the end to another busy year. In addition to all of the many tasks and duties your local government is responsible for, we've continued to do all that is necessary to do our part related to the ongoing pandemic which is affecting all. Unfortunately the pandemic has had a profound effect on all areas of town government, with many decisions being made to reflect mandates and guidance of many layers of government above the level of town governance. Hopefully we'll continue to see movement towards what we consider "normal" in the coming months.

An important area that has unfortunately been negatively affected by the pandemic over the past years has been recreation, which is increasingly becoming important to all. The effects of the pandemic brought an end to the CNBSA, an organization which had been doing a great job providing baseball and softball programming for many years. Additionally, the Town's summer recreation program has been unable to run for the past two years due to the stringent regulations which the Town has not had the resources to meet, ensuring a safe operation for the kids who typically spend many hours participating in recreational programming. There is, however, a bright side to this story. There have been many residents who stepped forward this year, putting together a limited summer ball program and also resurrected the farmers' market. Thank you to all who put a lot of time and effort into these and other endeavors.

Looking to 2022, we're hopeful that prior programming will be back in operation and possibly new recreational opportunities for residents of all ages can be organized. However, we need help. If you are willing and able to take a role in any type of recreational programming, please let us know. This includes sports, summer recreation programs, and any other type of programming for any age group. If you're interested in helping, please send a note to the Town Clerk with contact information and a brief description of any type of help you are willing to offer. Hopefully the Town Board, working with the Recreation Committee and resident

volunteers, can do a big part to make 2022 better than "normal". If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to contact any member of the Town Board.

Another bright side for tax payers is in the area of revenue the Town has and will be receiving. Recent grant awards we're working through include funding for new lavatories in the Town Park, funds for a new community center, and construction of a new salt storage building. Recently the Town received notice of an award to improve security on the Town campus and the surprise award of funding related to the Town's shared information technology with Niagara County. Looking to the future, we're hopeful that a recent grant application that has the potential to provide significant funding for continued improvements in the Town Park will come through. On top of this, sales tax revenue continues to be strong, as we were concerned about a significant loss as the pandemic took hold during 2020.

This past summer the Town received its share of funding from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), which will ultimately bring approximately \$700,000 of funding that will go a long way towards addressing needs in the areas of public safety and public works. To put this in perspective, we're all seeing increases in prices in the stores, but these price increases are much higher when it comes to purchasing public safety and public works equipment. The increases are often so significant that price quotes can only be


considered rough approximations, as the final price of a piece of equipment is set at the time of purchase, a price that is almost certainly higher than the quote. When you see a fire truck or piece of public works equipment, be mindful that each

piece of equipment is priced in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The Town's population is often a consideration in funding and accurate numbers only help. The official population of the Town of Pendleton recorded in the 2020 census is 7.035, an increase of 10% since 2010. Our town is one of the few municipalities in WNY that actually grew over the past decade, which I'm guessing is no surprise to most.

## FROM THE WATER/SEWER BILLING DEPARTMENT

This has been a very busy year, with a lot of changes! The new water bill went out in July, no more post cards to get lost in between the magazines! My apologies to anyone that had old information on the water bills, the conversion from the old billing system to the new billing system did not go as smoothly as I would have liked and there were many phone calls received the first week or so regarding changes that needed to be made. If you found owner information on your bill that you want removed, you must call me at (716) 625-8833 ext. 111, and I will tell you what you need to provide me. Some information cannot be removed without proper documents.

Well here it is the last week of August and we are finally getting the hot summer weather we should have had in July, I was beginning to think it would never stop raining! Hopefully we will have a nice Fall this year, which is my favorite season of all. I've been hearing rumors of a very snowy winter this year. I hope they are wrong!

I am expecting the consumptions for the October water billing to be lower than normal this year due to all the rain we had in July (the consumption period for your October water bill reflects water used in July, August & September). Remember that when you compare your water consumptions you must compare billing period to billing period (ex. Oct. 2020 with Oct. 2019; Oct. 2018 with Oct. 2017 and so forth) not previous to current bill.

I have been very busy getting ready for the upcoming levy. Remember that there will be a \$100.00 surcharge for any account that is unpaid as of 4:00pm Friday, September 24, 2021. Letters will be going out to anyone this may apply to. If your mailing address changes you need to notify me as soon as possible. This includes phone numbers too, we need your phone number in case of an emergency (i.e. broken water lines, sewer breaks, water being shut at the road, etc.) so please contact me if your address or phone number changes.

#### PLEASE REMEMBER THAT THE TOWN OF PENDLETON DOES NOT MAKE ADJUSTMENTS FOR SPRINKLER SYSTEMS OR THE FILLING OF SWIMMING POOLS.

- Billing cycles occur in January, April, July and October.
- Water bills are mailed out by the last Friday of the billing month.
- If you do not receive a bill by the end of the first week of the following month please contact the billing department at 625-8833, ext. 111.
- All payments go to the Town Clerk's Office

- For your convenience there is a lockbox located in the foyer at the back entrance to the Town Hall.
- If you pay online please allow <u>10 business days</u> for mailing.

If you are selling your home please contact the Water & Sewer Department at 625-8033, as soon as possible to schedule a MANDATORY compliance inspection. YOU MUST HAVE THE COMPLIANCE INSPECTION COMPLETED BEFORE YOU CLOSE ON YOUR HOUSE!!! There is a \$50.00 fee for the inspection. If any repairs need to be made, there may be additional fees involved. If you are purchasing a new home please contact our office ASAP to set up an account.

If you are leaving temporarily (i.e. Vacation) please consider prepaying your account to avoid late fees. You can now pay your water bills online at: www.PENDLETONNY.US

#### FROM THE DOG CONTROL OFFICER

It goes without saying our four-legged friends are as much a part of our family as anyone, and as such it's of the utmost importance we make sure they are happy, healthy, and properly accounted for.

First off, I would just like to touch on the importance of keeping up on your dog's licensing and vaccinations. This is not a matter within the town's discretion, but rather a state imposed regulation under NYS Agriculture and Markets Law. All dogs over four months of age are required to be licensed with their local municipality, and subsequently have their appropriate rabies vaccinations. This license is valid for one year from the original date of issuance. Please note that fees were increased at the beginning of 2021 to \$8 for neutered/spayed and \$20 for unneutered/unspayed.

Another important topic is tracking chips for your dog. It is not required, but certainly encouraged that you have a chip applied to your dog soon after acquiring them. Chips are a cost effective, one time thing that last the entire life of the dog, and make it much easier for myself and other agencies to locate you in the unfortunate event you are separated from your four legged friend. It is important to note, however, that just because you've had your vet implant the chip, DOES NOT mean it is ready to work. After the chip is put in place, you must go to the appropriate provider's website (e.g. Petlink, Buddy I.D, and many others) and register your dog's chip to ensure they are in the system and we are able to track it should we come into possession of your dog. Another tried and true way to ensure your beloved pet makes their way home is a simple collar with your current phone and address information on it. Anything and everything can make a world of difference when they're lost and scared.

Lastly, in regards to neighborly relations as it relates to your dog's etiquette; please be considerate. If your dog is barking at all hours of the night, it is not likely you are the only one who can hear it. Not all residents are as fond of dogs as you are either, and they may not take kindly to yours coming into their yard. If you find yourself in a situation where you feel your neighbor's dog is in the wrong, I always advocate for neighborly dialogue and honest solutions, but in the event that is not possible, you do have the right to file a formal complaint with the town.










#### PENDLETON BICENTENNIAL MURAL

The Pendleton Settlement Bicentennial Mural was dedicated August 12, 2021. The painting was specially commissioned to depict early years of how the settlement looked when Sylvester Pendleton Clarke purchased land and converted part of Tonawanda Creek tributary into the original location of the Erie Canal in 1821. The mural scene is when Pendleton Clarke welcomed the canal boat Seneca Chief on her voyage to New York City Harbor to officially open the Erie Canal in 1825. The mural is permanently displayed on Uncle G's Ice Cream Shop facing the original Erie Canal, now the Erie Canal Trailway.



The mural was created by retired Newfane Teacher and artist, Robert J. Rimmer. Prints and greeting cards featuring the mural are available for purchase at Uncle G's Ice Cream Shop as well as the Niagara Art Trail Gallery, Shop & Resource Center located in Wrights Corners Plaza. The Niagara Art Trail shop also features other works (originals and reproductions) by Bob.

Please be on the lookout for our Lions glasses collection boxes in our local businesses, Pendleton Star Pharmacy and Craft Coffee House. They are also at Pendleton United Methodist Church, and St. Paul's United Church of Christ. We do collect, refurbish and donate these all over the world. We do the same with hearing aids, so feel free to put them in too.

- There are more than 2,500 varieties of apples grown in the United States

#### NEWS FROM NIAGARA COUNTY

Just as Niagara County was ending its State of Emergency for COVID-19, we were hit with torrential rainfall from Lewiston to Lockport that



caused significant flooding and damage, and led to another brief State of Emergency. It once again proved you never know what's coming next, but you can certainly do your best to be prepared for it.

When it comes to Niagara County government, our emergency preparedness is led by Emergency Services Director Jonathan Schultz. We are very fortunate to have someone of his caliber leading our Emergency Services Department and serving as fire coordinator. Essentially, Jon serves as our lead "first responder" coordinating with volunteer fire companies, the Sheriff's Office, the Health Department and others to meet the demands of any given situation. Jon has been recognized by the International Association of Emergency Managers (IAEM) as being among the group of professionals who have maintained their Certified Emergency Manager® (CEM®) designation. The CEM® designation presently is held by only 2,000 men and women globally in the emergency management profession.

But we all have a part to play in emergency preparedness and that is why Jon and his team have released the free - Prepare Niagara - smartphone app. The Prepare Niagara app allows the county to reach out to the community quickly in the event of any type of emergency. Research has shown that over 80 percent of people in the United States own and use smartphones as their primary means of communication so this a very

important tool for us to get important information out. Beyond that, the app offers a host of other features to aid in emergency situations including:

- Submit damage reports
- View evacuation procedures
- Receive push notifications
- Connect to the organization's social media platforms
- View shelter locations
- Read recent news and press releases
- Review emergency plans and checklists for your family

The Niagara County Emergency Services app is available for download for free in the App Store and Google Play by searching "Niagara County Emergency, NY" or going to https://apps.myocv.com/share/a58414094. I encourage Pendleton residents to take a minute and download this very useful and important app.

One other quick topic I wanted to cover. The county has been alerted about a scam that involves residents receiving a purported phone call from Niagara County telling them there has been a security breach in county government and asking them to verify personal information.

Like so many of these scams, this is an attempt to obtain your personal information that can be used to steal your identity. Niagara County does not randomly call residents and ask for your personal information. The scammers appear to have "spoofed" a legitimate Niagara County number. If you receive a call and are unsure if it is legitimate, hang up and call the county's Public Information Office at (716) 439-7241 which can assist you.

#### PENDLETON TOWN HISTORIAN

Upon the heel of Autumn, it is natural to seek out the creature comforts: warm clothing, hot apple cider and mysterious tales. Perhaps to that list "cemeteries" would make a lovely addition. We've a small collection in Pendleton. It is also important to note some fall under the "private property" category. It is essential permission is granted first.

#### 1.) Acacia Memorial Park

Established in 1928, Acacia Memorial Park is the newest cemetery in town. It was originally intended for freemasons and their families. Now it welcomes all denominations. At 218 acres, It is located on Tonawanda Creek Road several hundred yards from West Canal Marina. It's perfect for a leisurely stroll.

#### 2.) Wendelville - Saint Paul's U C of C

This cemetery is the original Evangelical Reformed (the other portion is located on Bear Ridge Road, North of Killian). It's on around 1/2 acre of land and is well maintained. Some of the markers pre-date the Civil War. There are many German surnames that look familiar to long time residents.

## 3.) Saint John Neumann Cemetery At Good Shepherd

The only Roman Catholic parish and cemetery in town, it sits on one full acre of land. A small chapel on the property was built in memory of Henry, Anna, Joseph and Mathilda Winter. There are old and new sections.

#### 4.) King Family Cemetery

This cemetery is on private property (right behind the Clarke family plot) located down the road from Uncle G's and not far from the dead end on Monroe Street. It was in use for decades.

#### 5.) Bear Ridge Cemetery - Ridgeville

This cemetery is on 4 acres. 4-H pioneer Gertrude Warren was buried here in 1979. The cemetery is still in use.

#### 6.) Bear Ridge #2 - Evangelical Reformed

With both new and old sections, this cemetery is mentioned in a book of maps in 1859. The land undulates slightly. It is the continuation of Wendelville's U C of C on Tonawanda Creek. Both cemeteries are afiliated with Saint Paul's U C of C on Old Tonawanda Creek Road.

#### 7.) Bear Ridge #1

This is located in a small wooded area. It is derelict and overgrown. The graves cannot be seen from the road. It is on private property.

#### 8.) Poole - Andrus

One of the earliest cemeteries, some of the dates go as far back as the 1810s. Local legend Noah Strickland is interred here. Gravestones are stacked in a razed

bed. It's condition was recorded as poor with gravestones strewn about property. It's located 1/4 mile from Aiken Road.

## **Evangelical** - **Methodist**

9.)

This cemetery sits far back in a wooded area (unable to be seen from the road). It



belonged to a Methodist Church that burned down prior to 1900. It is no longer in use. It is on private property.

#### 10.) Clark/Clarke Family Cemetery

This small cemetery is feet away from the King Cemetery on Monroe Street. It contains the graves of town founder, Sylvester Pendleton Clarke, and many of his family members. The dates range mostly from the 1820s until 1860s. It is no longer in use.

Additionally, it is curious to include that the gravestones contain an evolution in artwork. Have you noticed different symbols and motifs? Each one has a meaning. When was the last time you took a trip to visit our ancestors?

I'd like to thank the readers for their ongoing interest in the preservation of Pendleton's history. This is no small task and it benefits all to participate. If you move from your primary residence in Pendleton it is your obligation to notify the Assessor's office. Each residence that is receiving the Star Exemption signed the Star application acknowledging that they would notify the Assessor of their change in residency.

Please remember **all** exemptions are due **by March 1**<sup>st</sup>. If you will be turning 65 in 2021 you may be eligible for the Enhanced Star. If you believe you might be eligible please call the Assessor's office 625-8833 ext. 131. If this is your **FIRST** time applying for Enhanced Star, then you will do so through our office. If you are switching to the **Star Credit Check**, then you do so online at www.tax.ny.gov or by calling (518) 457-2036.

## Interesting Facts about Autumn From justfunfacts.com

- The date of the beginning of autumn varies according to climate, tradition and culture, but when it is autumn in the Northern Hemisphere it is spring in the Southern Hemisphere, and viceversa.
- In the Northern Hemisphere, the first day of autumn - lasts from the autumnal equinox (September 22, 2021) to the winter solstice (December 21, 2021). In the Southern Hemisphere, autumn lasts from March until June.
- The reason the solstices and equinoxes don't come on the same day each year is because the Earth doesn't circle the sun in exactly 365 days.
- The first day of autumn or the autumnal equinox has 12 hours of daylight and 12 hours of darkness.
   The term equinox comes from the Latin words aeguus, meaning equal and nox, meaning night.
- Autumn begins when the center of the sun crosses the Earth's equator. As Earth continues it's path around the sun, days become shorter and nights become longer.
- The Earth's orbit around the sun has very little

- effect over the Seasons on Earth. Instead, it is the tilt of Earth's rotational axis, which is angled at around 23.5 degrees, that creates seasons.
- While Americans typically use the word "fall", the British use the word "autumn", though both terms date around the 16th century. Before these terms, this period was called "harvest".
- The word "harvest" comes from the Old Norse word haust, which means "to gather or pluck". As people moved into cities, "harvest" fell out of use and city dwellers began using "fall of the leaf" which was shortened to "fall".
- One of the most stunning signs of autumn is the turning of the leaves. Leaves change their wardrobes in response to chilly temperatures and less light; they stop producing chlorophyll. As greens fade, the leaves other pigments, such as yellow and orange of carotenoids shine through. Vibrant red hues are the result of anthocyanins, pigments that are produced in the fall.
- A "harvest moon" is the full moon closest to the autumnal equinox. Before artificial lighting, such moonlight was essential to a farmer's successful harvest.

Hot turkey roasting, potatoes done well!




