A message from your Supervisor...

Work continues on multiple projects and we're looking forward to new facilities being available to the community soon. Driving past the Town Hall, you can't miss the new community center, which has been under construction for awhile now. Though you may not have noticed much change on the exterior lately, work on the interior continues. I won't attempt to make any promises on a completion date, but the work is on schedule and I would anticipate an initial opening taking place by late summer.

In previous articles, I've mentioned the paving that will take place around the Town Hall and park and plans are coming together to do this. This work will include repaving the main parking lot as well as paving the unpaved lot adjacent to the community center. This work is long overdue and we're certainly excited to finally see this happen.

Hopefully, the coming summer weather will be better than last year, as we're also looking forward to the opening of the splash pad. Once the park is dry, grading and seeding work around the park can finally begin, cleaning-up the areas around the splash pad and community center. As stated in the past, work last year was slowed by the near-continuous rain we experienced most of last summer.

I've received a lot of inquiries about the condition of the roller hockey and tennis courts at Depeau Park and we're nearing completion of grant funding that will substantially fund the cost of reworking these areas. If things go well, we may be able to complete the work by the end of the year. We also anticipate striping the tennis courts for tennis and pickleball, which has also been a request. As for the tennis courts at the Town, we're still evaluating options and hopefully we can address the issues there in the near future.

Other projects are in the works or complete. A standby generator was finally installed at the Highway Garage, as this was part of the project that also included the construction of a salt storage building. Work also continues on the town's computer network, including construction

of a new server room, installation of new and additional security cameras, and expansion of the access control system that controls access to the Town Hall, Highway Garage, and new community center. There are a lot of components to these projects, but I'm optimistic that all work will be substantially finished by the end of the year.

Other than this, there's not much going on. All are working hard to take care of the many basic operations that residents rely on.

REMINDER

If you move from your primary residence in Pendleton, it is your obligation to notify the Assessor's office. Each residence that is receiving the STAR Exemption signed the STAR application acknowledging that they would notify the Assessor of their change in residency.

As a resident/owner of property in Pendleton, there are property tax exemptions that you may be entitled to – including STAR, Enhanced STAR, Senior Citizens, Veterans, Agricultural, people with Disabilities and Volunteer Firefighters & Ambulance Workers. For information on any of these exemptions you can either visit the New York State Department of Tax and Finance website www.tax.ny.gov, our website www.pendletonny.us, or visit the Assessor's office at Pendleton Town Hall or contact us by phone at 716-625-8833.

If you are signing up for Basic STAR, you need to go to the New York State website noted above or call (518) 457-2036 to sign up for the Basic STAR Credit (which is a check from New York State vs. receiving an Exemption). Additionally, any resident/owner who is currently receiving a Star Exemption can switch to the credit program by contacting the New York State Department of Tax and Finance, via their website or phone number.

All Enhanced STAR applications require enrollment in the New York State Income Verification Program (IVP). Note, if you are currently enrolled in the Enhanced STAR Exemption or Credit, you do not need to renew your application (unless you are contacted by our office or New York State.

The forms for all the exemptions and the IVP program are available at the Town Hall or can be obtained via the Pendleton or New York State websites. Deadline for all exemptions is March 1st.



NEWS FROM NIAGARA COUNTY

Column by Legislator Tony Nemi

Usually, I like to cover very local issues in my columns. But this month, I think it's important to inform the public about some environmental regulations that New York State is trying to pass in

regards to Hydrofluorocarbons (HFCs) that are used in all sorts of cooling equipment. My colleagues and I in the Niagara County Legislature submitted comments to the state Office of Climate Change opposing these policy changes because once again, it seems the state is taking action that is poorly thought-through, will negatively impact residents and produce very little to actually address climate change.

Let me first say that just because I raise questions on state policy – like the idea of taking away gas furnaces in a region like ours with cold winters – does not mean I am against taking reasonable steps to enhance environmental protections. What I do oppose is New York acting by itself on climate policies that will have no real impact on the environment but will create tremendous hardship on our residents and even put lives at risk.

So, back to HFC rules. HFC refrigerants are important to grocery and convenience stores, schools, hotels, restaurants and other retailers that rely on large freezers and coolers. Not only would the state ban HFCs, their policy would force businesses to replace or retrofit existing equipment, regardless of its age, performance, or remaining service life, with alternative refrigerants that are not readily available, not proven to be safer or higher performing, and not compatible with current infrastructure. In other words, it would require a solution

that cannot be reasonably implemented.

As you can imagine, this is particularly problematic for the grocery industry and there is no doubt that this policy will raise the cost of groceries on every family in New York State. Every person who walks out of a grocery store is shocked and angered about the price of butter, milk and other basics, and the state seems determined to make it worse. State leaders seem to fail to realize that when they impose higher costs in the grocery supply chain, those costs are ultimately paid for by consumers. And worse than that, these rules will force many small grocery and convenience stores to go out of business, creating more "food deserts" across the state where people do not have easy access to grocery products.

What is particularly maddening is that the federal government already has a timetable for phasing out certain HFCs that applies equally to everyone across the country and provides ample time for businesses to make the necessary changes. New York State usurping federal guidelines will have no appreciable impact on climate change, proving that this initiative is really about a few policymakers being able to show how "green" they are to special interest groups, regardless of its impact on regular citizens.

My colleagues in the Niagara County Legislature cannot vote to stop these actions, but we are doing our best to raise awareness and get the public involved so we can force the state to reconsider this policy. BRUSH COLLECTION

Reminder, chipping dates will be posted on the Town Hall electronic sign. It will also be listed on the town website and Facebook for everyone's reference.

REMINDER, WE DO NOT CHIP BRUSH FROM JULY 4TH TO LABOR DAY.

All brush must be placed neatly in piles that our town workers can safely pull apart. Brush should be sticking out butt end at the road no bigger than 6 inches in

diameter. Stretch the piles out rather than stacking them too high for the safety of our workers. Do not stack higher than 2-3 feet. We do not chip brush that contains vines nor poison ivy.

The town does not chip brush that comes off vacant lots or wooded areas. Please be advised that this service is provided for yard clean up purposes only.

When you hire a contractor to come in and remove a tree or limbs, it is the responsibility of the contractor to chip and remove the tree and/or limbs properly.

TOWN HISTORIAN

"He extended his hand and said, 'I am glad to see one real American here." I shook his hand and said, 'We are all Americans here, sir." Brigadier General Ely S. Parker (Donehogawa) on his meeting with Confederate General Robert E. Lee at the McLean House, Appomattox, Virginia in April 1865.



Before the curious gaze of the first European settlers, this land was nurtured by deeply connected people. Their customs and culture were diametrically opposed to the pale strangers that appeared in gradually larger numbers. With hundreds of tribes spread across an unsullied landscape, these people favored a matrilineal society, tracing lineage through the mother's line.

Before Pendleton was a dream in the mind of its creator, it was a wilderness with springs and streams. The clay soil yielded medicinal herbs and edible plants. It was pregnant with life. This land sustained the Wenrohronon, or Wenro, people. Their name translates to "people of the place of the floating film," referring to the oil spring by which they lived in Cuba, New York.

The Wenro people, like their small tribal kin: the Petún (tobacco), Neuter (neutral), Erie, or Huron, were an Iroquoian language tribe. Like their tribal kin, they did not stand a chance against the mighty Seneca nation. Armed with sheer force and sophisticated means, the Senecas dominated the fur trade. The Beaver Wars of the 1600s were fought along Western New York into its Southern Tier. The Wenro and their tribal kin were all but conquered; the few left assimilated into nearby tribes or

were pushed further south. The remnants of the conflict can be found in many local places.

The marshy areas of Pendleton, particularly those along Tonawanda Creek, were fertile areas for the Wenro. If one looks closely, perhaps in their backyard, the remains of our indigenous neighbors can be found. History is indeed

alive and well.
